How To Use This Devotional Journal

Journaling is a powerful discipline to help you grow in your relationship with God. When we take the time to write down the Word of God with application, it will begin to take root in our hearts. In ancient times with Israel, it was the responsibility of each king to write down a copy of God's laws and apply it in his heart.

In Deuteronomy 17:18-20 (NIV) we read, "When he takes the throne of his kingdom, he is to write for himself on a scroll a copy of this law, taken from that of the priests, who are Levites. ¹⁹ It is to be with him, and he is to **read it** all the days of his life so that he may **learn to revere** the LORD his God and **follow carefully** all the words of this law and these decrees ²⁰ and **not consider himself better** than his brothers and turn from the law to the right or to the left. Then he and his descendants will reign a long time over his kingdom in Israel."

I have broken down the Bible passages into smaller sections for you to read. I suggest you read each passage 2-3 times and then write down how each passage applies to your everyday life. Asking questions is a great way to go deeper in your Bible Study. The goal is to go deeper in the Word of God to strengthen your relationship with Jesus. READ one passage each day, REFLECT on what you have read, and then RESPOND by writing a personal prayer that will correlate to the passage you read. Use Saturday as a day to catch up if you need it. Sunday is designed to be a day to worship as a church and discuss any highlights of your week with your family and friends. Remember, knowledge isn't the goal, but rather life application of God's Word that blesses our family, church, and community.

In the back of this booklet there is a Prayer Journal. If you are like me, it is too easy to forget all that God has done and is doing. By keeping a record of your thankfulness and how God answers your prayers, you will see God at work. If you dare to keep a discipline of prayer for 30 days, I believe you will see God bring you on an amazing spiritual journey of His presence and joy.

The MacArthur Study Bible Commentary

The church at Philippi, the first one founded by Paul in Europe, dates from the apostle's second missionary journey ([Ac 16:12-40](#)). Philippi evidently had a very small Jewish population. Because there were not enough men to form a synagogue (the requirement was for 10 Jewish men who were heads of a household), some devout women met outside the city at a place of prayer ([Ac 16:13](#)) alongside the Gangites River. Paul preached the gospel to them and Lydia, a wealthy merchant dealing in expensive purple dyed goods ([Ac 16:14](#)), became a believer ([16:14, 15](#)). It is likely that the Philippian church initially met in her spacious home.

Satanic opposition to the new church immediately arose in the person of a demon-possessed, fortune-telling slave girl ([Ac 16:16, 17](#)). Not wanting even agreeable testimony from such an evil source, Paul cast the demon out of her ([Ac 16:18](#)). The apostle's act enraged the girl's masters, who could no longer sell her services as a fortune-teller ([Ac 16:19](#)). They hauled Paul and Silas before the city's magistrates ([Ac 16:20](#)) and inflamed the civic pride of the Philippians by claiming the two preachers were a threat to Roman customs ([Ac 16:20, 21](#)). As a result, Paul and Silas were beaten and imprisoned ([Ac 16:22-24](#)).

The two preachers were miraculously released from prison that night by an earthquake, which unnerved the jailer and opened his heart and that of his household to the gospel ([Ac 16:25-34](#)). The next day the magistrates, panicking when they learned they had illegally beaten and imprisoned two Roman citizens, begged Paul and Silas to leave Philippi.

Paul apparently visited Philippi twice during his third missionary journey, once at the beginning (cf. [2Co 8:1-5](#)), and again near the end ([Ac 20:6](#)). About 4 or 5 years after his last visit to Philippi, while a prisoner at Rome, Paul received a delegation from the Philippian church. The Philippians had generously supported Paul in the past ([4:15, 16](#)), and had also contributed abundantly for the needy at Jerusalem ([2Co 8:1-4](#)). Now, hearing of Paul's imprisonment, they sent another contribution to him ([4:10](#)), and along with it Epaphroditus to minister to Paul's needs. Unfortunately Epaphroditus suffered a near-fatal illness ([2:26, 27](#)), either while en route to Rome, or after he arrived. Accordingly, Paul decided to send Epaphroditus back to Philippi ([2:25, 26](#)) and wrote the letter to the Philippians to send back with him.

Paul had several purposes in composing this epistle. First, he wanted to express in writing his thanks for the Philippians' gift ([4:10-18](#)). Second, he wanted the Philippians to know why he decided to return Epaphroditus to them, so they would not think his service to Paul had been unsatisfactory ([2:25, 26](#)). Third, he wanted to inform them about his circumstances at Rome ([1:12-26](#)). Fourth, he wrote to exhort them to unity ([2:1, 2; 4:2](#)). Finally, he wrote to warn them against false teachers ([3:1-4:1](#)).

Read:

Invest In Thinking The Best

“This letter is from Paul and Timothy, slaves of Christ Jesus. I am writing to all of God’s holy people in Philippi who **belong** to Christ Jesus, including the elders and deacons. ² May God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ give you **grace and peace**. ³ Every time I **think** of you, I **give thanks** to my God. ⁴ Whenever I **pray**, I make my **requests** for all of you **with joy**, ⁵ for you have been my **partners** in **spreading the Good News** about Christ from the time you first heard it until now.

⁶ **And I am certain that God, who began the good work within you, will continue His work until it is finally finished on the day when Christ Jesus returns.**” ⁷ So it is right that I should feel as I do about all of you, for you have a special place in my heart. **You share** with me the special favor of God, both in my imprisonment and in **defending** and **confirming** the truth of the Good News. ⁸ God knows how much I love you and **long for you** with the tender compassion of Christ Jesus.

⁹ **I pray that your love will overflow more and more, and that you will keep on growing in knowledge and understanding.** ¹⁰ **For I want you to understand what really matters, so that you may live pure and blameless lives until the day of Christ’s return.** ¹¹ May you always be filled with the fruit of your salvation—the righteous character produced in your life by Jesus Christ—for this will bring much glory and praise to God.” **Philippians 1:1-11 (NLT2)**

Day 2 _____ / Date

Read:

Invest In An Eternal Perspective Of The Gospel Being Advanced

“And I want you to know, my dear brothers and sisters, that everything that has happened to me here has helped to spread the Good News. ¹³ For everyone here, **including the whole palace guard**, knows that I am in chains because of Christ. ¹⁴ And because of my imprisonment, most of the believers here have **gained confidence** and **boldly speak** God’s message without fear. ¹⁵ It’s true that some are preaching out of jealousy and rivalry. But others preach about Christ with pure motives. ¹⁶ They preach because they love me, for they know I have been appointed to defend the Good News. ¹⁷ Those others do not have pure motives as they preach about Christ. They preach with **selfish ambition**, not sincerely, intending to make my chains more painful to me. ¹⁸ But that doesn’t matter. Whether their motives are false or genuine, the message about Christ is being preached either way, so I rejoice. And I will continue to rejoice. ¹⁹ For I know that as you pray for me and the Spirit of Jesus Christ helps me, this will lead to my deliverance.” **Philippians 1:12-19 (NLT2)**

Day 3 _____ / Date

Read:

Paul's Life For Christ

²⁰ “For I fully expect and hope that I will never be ashamed, but that I will continue to be **bold for Christ**, as I have been in the past. And I trust that my life will bring honor to Christ, whether I live or die. ²¹ For to me, living means living for Christ, and dying is even better. ²² But if I live, **I can do more fruitful work for Christ**. So I really don't know which is better. ²³ I'm torn between two desires: I long to go and be with Christ, which would be far better for me. ²⁴ But for your sakes, it is better that I continue to live.

²⁵ **Knowing this, I am convinced that I will remain alive so I can continue to help all of you grow and experience the joy of your faith.** ²⁶ And when I come to you again, you will have even more reason to take pride in Christ Jesus because of what he is doing through me. ²⁷ Above all, you must live as citizens of heaven, conducting yourselves in a manner worthy of the Good News about Christ. Then, whether I come and see you again or only hear about you, I will know that you are standing side by side, fighting together for the faith, which is the Good News. ²⁸ Don't be intimidated in any way by your enemies. This will be a sign to them that they are going to be destroyed, but that you are going to be saved, even by God himself. ²⁹ For you have been given not only the privilege of trusting in Christ but also the privilege of suffering for him. ³⁰ We are in this struggle together. You have seen my struggle in the past, and you know that I am still in the midst of it.”

Philippians 1:20-30 (NLT2)

When he appeared in human form, ⁸ he humbled himself in obedience to God and died a criminal’s death on a cross. ⁹ **Therefore, God elevated him to the place of highest honor and gave him the name above all other names, ¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.”** Philippians 2:5-11 (NLT2)

¹² “Dear friends, you always followed my instructions when I was with you. And now that I am away, it is even more important. Work hard to **show the results** of your salvation, obeying God with deep reverence and fear.

¹³ **For God is working in you, giving you the desire and the power to do what pleases him.** ¹⁴ **Do everything without complaining and arguing,** ¹⁵ **so that no one can criticize you. Live clean, innocent lives as children of God, shining like bright lights in a world full of crooked and perverse people.** ¹⁶ **Hold firmly to the word of life;** then, on the day of Christ’s return, I will be proud that I did not run the race in vain and that my work was not useless. ¹⁷ But I will rejoice even if I lose my life, pouring it out like a liquid offering to God, just like your faithful service is an offering to God. And I want all of you to share that joy. ¹⁸ Yes, you should rejoice, and I will share your joy.” **Philippians 2:12-18 (NLT2)**

Then he can cheer me up by telling me how you are **getting along**. ²⁰ I have no one else like Timothy, who genuinely cares about your welfare. ²¹ All the others care only for themselves and not for what matters to Jesus Christ. ²² But you know how Timothy has proved himself. Like a son with his father, he has served with me in preaching the Good News. ²³ I hope to send him to you just as soon as I find out what is going to happen to me here. ²⁴ And I have confidence from the Lord that I myself will come to see you soon.” **Philippians 2:19-24 (NLT2)**

Paul Commends Epaphroditus

²⁵ “Meanwhile, I thought I should send **Epaphroditus** back to you. He is a true brother, co-worker, and fellow soldier. And he was your messenger to help me in my need. ²⁶ I am sending him because he has been longing to see you, and he was very distressed that you heard **he was ill**. ²⁷ And he certainly was ill; in fact, he almost died. But **God had mercy on him—and also on me**, so that I would not have one sorrow after another. ²⁸ So I am all the more anxious to send him back to you, for I know you will be glad to see him, and then I will not be so worried about you. ²⁹ Welcome him with Christian love and with great joy, and **give him the honor** that people like him deserve. ³⁰ For he **risked his life** for the work of Christ, and he was at the point of death while doing for me what you couldn’t do from far away.” **Philippians 2:25-30 (NLT2)**

Day 8 _____ / Date

Investing In Believing That God Is At Work

¹ “Whatever happens, my dear brothers and sisters, **rejoice in the Lord**. I never get tired of telling you these things, and **I do it to safeguard your faith**. ² Watch out for those **dogs**, those people who do evil, those **mutilators** who say you must be circumcised to be saved. ³ For we who worship by the Spirit of God are the ones who are truly circumcised. **We rely on what Christ Jesus has done for us**. We put **no confidence in human effort**, ⁴ though I could have confidence in my own effort if anyone could. Indeed, if others have reason for confidence in their own efforts, I have even more! ⁵ I was circumcised when I was eight days old. I am a pure-blooded citizen of Israel and a member of the tribe of Benjamin—a real Hebrew if there ever was one! I was a member of the Pharisees, who demand the strictest obedience to the Jewish law. ⁶ I was so zealous that I harshly persecuted the church. And as for righteousness, I obeyed the law without fault. ⁷ I once thought these things were valuable, but now I consider them worthless because of what Christ has done. ⁸ **Yes, everything else is worthless when compared with the infinite value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord**. For his sake I have discarded everything else, counting it all as garbage, so that I could gain Christ ⁹ and become one with him. I no longer count on my own righteousness through obeying the law; rather, I become righteous through faith in Christ. For God’s way of making us right with himself depends on faith. ¹⁰ **I want to know Christ and experience the mighty power that raised him from the dead. I want to suffer with him, sharing in his death, ¹¹ so that one way or another I will experience the resurrection from the dead!”**

Philippians 3:1-11 (NLT2)

Their god is their appetite, they brag about shameful things, and they think only about this life here on earth. ²⁰ But we are citizens of heaven, where the Lord Jesus Christ lives. And we are eagerly waiting for him to return as our Savior. ²¹ He will take our **weak mortal bodies** and **change** them into **glorious bodies** like his own, using the same power with which he will bring everything under his control.” **Philippians 3:17-21 (NLT2)**

¹ “Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stay true to the Lord. I love you and long to see you, dear friends, for you are my joy and the crown I receive for my work.

² Now I appeal to Euodia and Syntyche. Please, because you belong to the Lord, **settle your disagreement.** ³ And I ask you, my true partner, to help these two women, for they worked hard with me in telling others the Good News. They worked

along with Clement and the rest of my co-workers, whose names are **written in the Book of Life.** ⁴ **Always be full of joy in the Lord. I say it again—rejoice!** ⁵ Let everyone see that you are considerate in all you do. Remember, the Lord is coming soon.

⁶ **Don’t worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done.** ⁷ **Then you will experience God’s peace, which exceeds anything we can understand. His peace will guard your hearts and minds as you live in Christ Jesus.** ⁸ And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. **Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise.** ⁹ **Keep putting into practice** all you learned and received from me—everything you heard from me and saw me doing. Then the God of peace will be with you.”

¹⁰ “How I praise the Lord that you are concerned about me again. I know you have always been concerned for me, but you didn’t have the chance to help me.

¹¹ Not that I was ever in need, for I have learned **how to be content** with whatever I have. ¹² **I know how to live on almost nothing or with everything. I have learned**

the secret of living in every situation, whether it is with a full stomach or empty, with plenty or little. ¹³ **For I can do everything through Christ, who gives me strength.** ¹⁴ Even so, you have done well to **share** with me in my present difficulty.

¹⁵ As you know, you Philippians were the only ones who gave me **financial help** when I first brought you the Good News and then traveled on from Macedonia. No other church did this. ¹⁶ Even when I was in Thessalonica you **sent help** more than once. ¹⁷ I don’t say this because I want a gift from you. Rather, I want you to receive a reward for your kindness. ¹⁸ At the moment I have all I need—and more! I am generously supplied with the gifts you sent me with Epaphroditus. They are a sweet-smelling sacrifice that is acceptable and pleasing to God. ¹⁹ **And this same God**

who takes care of me will supply all your needs from his glorious riches, which have been given to us in Christ Jesus. ²⁰ Now all glory to God our Father forever and ever! Amen. ²¹ Give my greetings to each of God’s holy people—all who belong to Christ Jesus. The brothers who are with me **send you their greetings.** ²² And all the rest of God’s people send you greetings, too, especially those in Caesar’s household. ²³ May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. **Philippians 4:10-23 (NLT2)**
