Because Jesus Is The Resurrection And The Life:

1. Our Circumstances Are For God's Glory

¹ Now a man named Lazarus was sick. He was from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. ² This Mary, whose brother Lazarus now lay sick, was the same one who poured perfume on the Lord and wiped his feet with her hair. ³ So the sisters sent word to Jesus, "Lord, **the one you love** is sick." ⁴ When he heard this, Jesus said, "This sickness will not end in death. No, it is for **God's glory** so that God's Son may be glorified through it." **John 11:1-4 (NIV)**

⁵ Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. ⁶ Yet when he heard that Lazarus was sick, he **stayed** where he was **two** more days. ⁷ Then he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea." ⁸ "But Rabbi," they said, "a short while ago the Jews tried to **stone you**, and yet you are going back there?" ⁹ Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? A man who walks by day will not stumble, for he sees by this world's light. ¹⁰ It is when he walks by night that he stumbles, for he has no light." ¹¹ After he had said this, he went on to tell them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep; but I am going there to wake him up." ¹² His disciples replied, "Lord, if he sleeps, he will get better." ¹³ Jesus had been speaking of his death, but his disciples thought he meant natural sleep. ¹⁴ So then he told them plainly, "**Lazarus is dead**, ¹⁵ and for your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." ¹⁶ Then **Thomas** (called Didymus) said to the rest of the disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him." ¹⁷ On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for **four days**. ¹⁸ **Bethany** was less than two miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁹ and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them in the loss of their brother. **John 11:5-19 (NIV)**

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2. Believe In The Eternal

When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed at home. ²¹ "Lord," Martha said to Jesus, "**if you had been here**, my brother would **not have died**. ²² But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask." ²³ Jesus said to her, "Your brother will **rise again**." ²⁴ Martha answered, "I know he will rise again in the **resurrection** at the last day." ²⁵ Jesus said to her, "**I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; ²⁶ and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" ²⁷ "Yes, Lord," she told him, "I believe that you are the Christ**, the **Son of God**, who was to come into the world."

John 11:20-27 (NIV)

And after she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary aside. "The Teacher is here," she said, "and is asking for you." ²⁹ When Mary heard this, she got up quickly and went to him. ³⁰ Now Jesus had not yet entered the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. ³¹ When the Jews who had been with Mary in the house, comforting her, noticed how quickly she got up and went out, they followed her, supposing she was going to the tomb to mourn there. ³² When **Mary** reached the place where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said, "**Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.**" ³³ When Jesus saw her **weeping**, and the Jews who had come along with her also **weeping**, he was **deeply moved** in spirit and troubled. ³⁴ "Where have you laid him?" he asked. "Come and see, Lord," they replied. ³⁵ **Jesus wept**. ³⁶ Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" **John 11:28-36 (NIV)**

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But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" ³⁸ Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. ³⁹ "Take away the stone," he said. "But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odor, for he has been there four days." ⁴⁰ Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" ⁴¹ So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. ⁴² I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me."

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3. Anything Is Possible With Jesus

⁴³ When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴ The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face. Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go." ⁴⁵ Therefore many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary, and had seen what Jesus did, put their faith in him. John 11:43-45 (NIV)

Swindoll's Living Insights New Testament Commentary – John

Upon arriving at the burial cave of Lazarus, Jesus wept (literally, "shed tears"). And the observation of the people was spot-on. Jesus did indeed love Lazarus. While the Son of God is fully divine, He is completely human. Moreover, He is the perfect representation of the Father, who is Spirit, yet nonetheless emotionally connected to the creatures bearing His likeness. When we weep, our Creator weeps with us; not with the kind of hopelessness we endure through our ignorance, but with compassion. No one hates the devastating consequences of sin more than He.

Many of the religious leaders who visited Martha and Mary during their bereavement witnessed Jesus' power over death and chose to believe. However, some did not. Not even raising the dead convinced them! John concludes the story as he opened it, with a reminder of the danger Jesus faced being so close to Jerusalem (11:8, 16, 18).

Whenever I conduct the funeral of a believer in Jesus Christ, the promises of Easter fill my mind. Death is not the end for that individual. We weep because we miss seeing our loved one's face, hearing that familiar voice, feeling that reassuring touch. But we weep with a confident assurance that the souls of the dead in Christ are living joyfully in the presence of their Maker, awaiting the resurrection of their bodies (2 Cor. 5:1-10). We weep in anticipation of seeing them again.
